CURATOR required for the MURCHISON MUSEUM

- 2/ keeping it tidy and clean after the general working bee in March,

- 4/ keeping the general surrounding area tidy and requesting assistance from the Shire management when necessary.

The small curator cottage is air-conditioned and has internet access, telephone etc. There is a raised back garden which can be utilised for vegetables or herbs

The Murchison Museum is the most isolated museum in W.A. Situated at Murchison Settlement north of Mullewa it manages quite a few visitors who travel north on the Mullewa -Gascoyne Junction Road.

During the last few months we have acquired three lovely new 'artifacts'!

The **Boolardy Wool Wagon** was donated to us from the now defunct Greenough Pioneer

Museum. The wagon had been given to this museum from Bob Lefroy at Boolardy Station some many years ago.

It was built in Meekatharra prior to 1911 by "Gawthorne & Hill" reputed to be the best wagon builders in W.A. at the time.

The Boolardy wagon carried around 8 tons of wool bales. A chap called E.Harris drove it and there was a photo at Boolardy

dated 1911, of Harris at the reins of the fully loaded, double shafted, up to 12 horses, wagon near the shearing shed.

The last driver was a chap called Bert Birch who worked at Murgoo for some time and the last trip was made around 1938



Metters 1 Stove This beautiful small stove was 'rescued' by Pam Beasley (ne Maxwell) from Beringarra Station and passed on to Alan Blood (ex Beringarra) who then gave it to our museum.

It was originally based at the Colyeda Outcamp situated half way between Beringarra and Mt Gould Stations and began its cooking life in the early 1920's.

The out camp was downgraded in the early 1950's and this stove, unlike many others, survived vandalism and theft.

Alan and Robbie Foulkes-Taylor worked on the stove and it now sits proudly in the Murchison Museum with the lovely old copper kettle on top.

Copper Kettle ...donated by Pam Beasley (ne Maxwell) who, as a child, lived with her family on Meka Station.

Billy Johns was a motor mechanic who travelled in a purpose-built vehicle throughout the Murchison stations during the 1930's & 40's servicing station vehicles.

He hand-made this copper kettle from two large copper ball floats as a gift for Pam's mother Elvire Maxwell. It spent many years on the large Metters stove at Meka Station.


Uncle Jox thinks he is a bit of a baby whisperer from way back and he loves to carry me around and gets me to sleep..



What will the Digital Hubs program offer?

Digital Hubs will allow local residents to experience NBN-enabled services and technology. They will also provide training and assistance to explain the benefits of participating online and to encourage greater digital literacy skills. Digital Hubs users will have the opportunity to learn about best practice in cybersecurity and cybersafety. This will raise awareness of strategies for minimising online risks and provide confidence for home users to maximise the benefits of the digital economy.

Local residents will be able to attend group and oneon-one training to increase their digital literacy skills. This will enable them to experience technology and applications that take advantage of NBN functionality and high-speed broadband, which they could access at home once they are connected to the NBN.



Training will provide:

- an overview of the relevance and benefit of the NBN and high-speed internet environment to households
- overview of connectivity options—for example, fibre, ADSL, wireless, 3G
- basic-to-intermediate computer literacy skills for example, how to operate a computer, word processing, accessing the internet
- performing operations online—for example, searching, email, online banking, social networking, shopping, accessing government services
- · online safety and security





Digital Enterprise program

What is the Digital Enterprise program?

The Australian Government will provide \$10 million in grant funding to progressively establish a Digital Enterprise training service in each of the 40 communities that will first benefit from the National Broadband Network (NBN).

The Digital Enterprise program provides free information and training sessions to small-to-medium enterprises (SMEs) and not-for-profit organisations (NFPs), including local cultural organisations.

Digital Enterprise training will help businesses and organisations to better understand how they can take advantage of online opportunities, particularly those enabled or enhanced by the NBN.

The program will contribute to the government's vision that Australia will become a leading global digital economy by 2020. More details about this vision are available in the National Digital Economy Strategy (nbn.gov.au/digitaleconomystrategy).

What will the Digital Enterprise program offer?

The program will provide group training seminars, as well as one-on-one advice to SMEs and NFPs in their places of business, on how to harness the NBN to make greater use of online opportunities to conduct their existing processes more efficiently and better achieve their organisational goals. For example, SMEs will receive assistance and advice on how to:

- · improve online presence and marketing
- provide new or enhanced products and services
- expand their markets nationally and internationally
- improve their competitiveness and internal efficiencies

· better communicate with customers and suppliers.

In addition, NFPs will receive assistance and advice on how to:

- access and influence online audiences
- undertake online fundraising activities
- · provide online services
- achieve administrative efficiencies using online tools.

All SMEs and NFPs that have attended a Digital Enterprise group training session are eligible to receive a maximum of four hours face-to-face assistance and advice in their places of business. This one-on-one assistance will help participants to better understand the specific opportunities available to their organisations, and provide practical advice for improving their online activities.

Those big old aprons wiped many a perspiring brow, bent over the hot wood stove. Chips and kindling wood were brought into the kitchen in that apron.

From the garden, it carried all sorts of vegetables. After the peas had been shelled, it carried out the hulls.

In the autumn, the apron was used to bring in apples that had fallen from the trees.

When unexpected company drove up the road, it was surprising how much furniture that old apron could dust in a matter of seconds.

When dinner was ready, Grandma walked out onto the porch, waved her apron, and the men folk knew it was time to come in from the fields to dinner.

It will be a long time before someone invents something that will replace that 'old-time apron' that served so many purposes.

REMEMBER:

Grandma used to set her hot baked apple pies on the window sill to cool. Her granddaughters set theirs on the window sill to thaw.



Centenary of Anzac grants

Barry Haase, Federal Member for Durack, welcomed the funding of \$100,000 per Federal electorate to support community-based commemorative activities and projects to commemorate the Centenary of Anzac in 2015.

"After months of pressure from the community and the Liberal Party, the belated release by the Government of the funding guidelines can now give the community greater scope to plan for the future and consider how Durack can best commemorate events in our history."

Mr Haase said the Liberal Party was determined to work in a bi-partisan manner to deliver the Centenary of Anzac commemorations.

"I am pleased that community grants under this programme have been modelled on the highly-successful Australia Remembers 1945-1995 commemorations of the 50th anniversary or the end of World War Two."




