Road Works in the Murchison

Construction Crew

On return from their Christmas break, staff attended to minor repairs and maintenance of their plant and camping gear and then moved down to Billabalong wool shed to complete the last 4km of road works (shaping up and gravel sheeting) from the end of the bitumen 7.5 km south of Billabalong homestead to bitumen 1.2km north of the bridge on the Carnarvon Mullewa Road.

While in this area a new park bay has been put in place on the east side of existing bay and crew have also carted gravel onto 6 patches of badly corrugated sandy sections from Murchison River to the south boundary With the completion of the 4km road works and corrugated sections, crew will move camp and equipment to Yuin on the Beringarra Pindar road. They will then commence work on 3 dust suppression jobs (reforming and gravel sheeting 1 km of road to be sealed) at Tallering homestead, Yuin homestead and Pia Wadjarri community. Crew will also reshape one bad corner just north of Yuin -Twin Peaks boundary (commonly known as McNabb's corner) by lifting up 1m and gravel sheeting.

With completion of these works crew will then move to just south of Byro (15km) and commence gravel sheeting (6km) on the Carnarvon Mullewa road.

Maintenance Crew.

John and Glen are going along at a good pace with their maintenance grading. Roads graded this year to end of March:

- Woodleigh-Byro
- Muggon
- New Forrest/Yallalong
- Yallalong/Coolcalalaya
- Twin Peaks/Wooleen
- Twin Peaks/McNabb

Crew will start a full maintenance grade on the Carnarvon-Mullewa road heading south from Murchison River on 1st April.

With the completion of this section (south) crew will finish off the Wooleen/Mt Wittenoom – Mt Wittenoom/ Wooleen-Boolardy roads and then go back onto the Carnarvon-Mullewa road heading north from the settlement to north boundary and then all roads in the north of shire.

Heavy Maintenance

Sandy and Paul have finished their heavy maintenance programme for this year (building/repairs to bunds and small sections of roads requiring gravel sheeting) and are now forming up 3.5km section on the Carnarvon Mullewa road south of Byro in readiness for gravel sheeting by construction crew.

With all these road works in progress please do the right thing and slow down.

Apply now for your Local Sporting Champions grant

10 March 2014

Federal Member for Durack Melissa Price has today announced that applications are open for the 2014-15 Round 1 Local Sporting Champions (LSC) grants for eligible Durack residents.

The LSC program is an Australian Government initiative designed to provide financial assistance for young people aged 12-18 towards the cost of travel, accommodation or equipment when competing, coaching or officiating at an official national sporting organisation (NSO), endorsed state, national or international sporting championships or a School Sport Australia state or national championships.

"I encourage all eligible Durack residents to apply for the Round 1 grant funding, which is aimed at helping young people pursue their sporting dreams," Ms Price said.

"A number of changes have been made to the program to ensure that it continues to function as efficiently as possible, including changes to the age criteria and team grants.

- Changes to the age criteria will now require applicants to turn 12 to 18 in the year of the
 competition, rather than be between the ages of 12 and 18 (inclusive) at the start of the
 competition as previously required.
- The LSC program has removed Team grants, with funding instead being available for more individual grants. Fifty individual grants of \$500 will now be available for Durack applicants each year.

"These changes will streamline the application process and will ensure more young Durack residents are eligible to apply."

Below is an excerpt of what the judges had to say in 2013

Special Commendations and Category Winners Results

On entering Murchison Settlement, it was obvious why the community won the award for general appearance in 2012. It is a beautiful oasis of well maintained gardens and buildings in an isolated location. Not only have the locals continued to work hard to maintain the settlement, but they have added a variety of fresh new features to the area that see them once again win the award for **General Appearance 2013**.



Community Action and Partnerships

While this category was not entered, many projects around the settlement are an example of wonderful community action. The greenhouse, museum, construction of botanic walk and the relationship with the people at the Square Kilometre Array (SKA) are all examples that could have been included

The 'Astro Fest' sounds like a wonderful community event which we look forward to seeing in next year's submission.

General Appearance

Driving into Murchison Settlement is like taking a breath of fresh air. The locals do an incredible amount of work to maintain a beautiful setting and there is real pride among the community members to maintain this standard.

Many new features add to the lovely feel of the settlement. These include the addition of new shelters with tables around the roadhouse and caravan park as well as fire pits to warm the visiting tourists during a cold night in the caravan park! After recognising that noise impacts on those staying at the caravan park, an earth wall was built in front of the generator, to reduce the problem. The dedicated gardeners, always looking to improve the appearance of the surrounds, planted a variety of shrubs and flowers along this earth wall. The sports club also has a lovely new shade canopy.

The start of the botanical walk has had some work done, with the establishment of a native garden around the gazebo. A wonderful bird bath made out of recycled materials can be found here. A new crossing from the gazebo to the botanical walk has been installed.

Waste Management and Litter Prevention

While this category was not entered, we saw evidence of waste management that could have been included in the submission. There was abundant evidence of recycling old materials to make new features including the use of recycled materials to build a shelter over the old wool wagon, the use of an old satellite dish to plant flora and the use of scrap metal and an old tyre to build a delightful bird bath. We think Trevor should make and sell his very special bird baths!

Trevor and Leanne need to be commended for their commitment to driving the local roads and cleaning up roadside litter on a monthly basis.

Natural Environment Conservation

Work is still continuing on the Botanical and Heritage Walk and some progress has been made with the creation of flora signage using paint on rocks and the planting of some native flora. It doesn't matter how little – any progress made on this project can be entered into this category.

Heritage and Culture

An old wool wagon, originally from Boolardy Station has returned to the settlement and makes a great addition to the museum.

WA's oldest concrete bridge to be replaced

The replacement of the Ballinyoo Bridge will vastly improve the key Carnarvon-Mullewa Road access route thanks to \$3.5 million of Royalties for Regions funding announced last week.

The project, being delivered as part of the Mid West Investment Plan (MWIP), involves building a new bridge to span the Murchison River, replacing the existing 1929-built structure that has aged beyond repair.

Member for North West Central Vince Catania MLA said the bridge provided a lifeline for communities, industry, service providers and emergency services in the remote Murchison and Upper Gascoyne district.

"During times of flood lower level crossings of the Murchison River become impassable and without this bridge parts of the district can become isolated for extended periods," he said.

"A new bridge and upgraded road will increase the scope of tourism opportunities, provide an alternative route within the Gascoyne-Murchison Outback Pathways and ensure communities in the region stay connected."

Sections of the old bridge may be preserved and developed by the Shire of Murchison into interpretive material at the site, enriching the tourist experience.

Mr Catania said the Carnarvon-Mullewa Road was the main access route to the Murchison Radio-Astronomy Observatory, a project that has also received \$10 million in Royalties for Regions funding through the MWIP.

"As this project unfolds more sealing of the Carnarvon-Mullewa Road will be triggered, progressively improving road quality for all users," Mr Catania said.

Other road improvement projects in North West Central to receive MWIP funding include the Wubin-Mullewa Road (\$10.8m) and the Meekatharra-Wiluna Road (\$10m).

The \$220 million Royalties for Regions-funded MWIP aims to assist establishing a more sustainable social and economic base by implementing major infrastructure projects and initiatives that have been identified as essential to the Mid West region.

Royalties for Regions has committed \$72.778 million to 24 approved MWIP projects to date that have a total project value of \$152.447 million.

Five Shires awarded group funding for construction of the Murchison region vermin cell

The shires of Mount Magnet, Sandstone, Cue, Yalgoo and Wiluna are set to benefit from funding allocated from the Country Local Government Fund (CLGF) Projects – Regional Grouping Fund 2012-13 for the Murchison region vermin cell project.

The Royalties for Regions CLGF Regional Grouping Fund encourages local governments to come together to deliver projects that benefit multiple towns and regions.

Member for North West Central Vince Catania MLA said the regional grouping component of the CLGF is to provide financial assistance to local governments to fund large scale projects identified as priorities by the towns themselves. The Murchison region vermin cell project aims to construction a dog proof fence to create a fully enclosed Vermin Cell in the Murchison region to eradicate wild dogs within the cell and increase small livestock numbers (sheep and goats) in the pastoral industry.

"I congratulate the four shires for winning this competitive funding which clearly demonstrates the high level of collaboration and partnership among these agencies. Sharing financial and non-financial resources is central for communities in the remote and rural regions. I am excited about the additional benefits for the residents of the Murchison region as a result of their joint efforts", said Vince.

"Pastoral production has experienced a sharp decline of the past decade attributed to drought and wild dogs. The low stock numbers and productivity are considered to be largely caused by wild dog predation".


The completed fence will be 1,400km in length and will comprise 100km of fence (to be constructed through this funding) in conjunction with existing fence (450km of State Barrier Fence and 470km of the MRVC Vermin Fence 1 and 2). It is proposed that this group would manage and subsequently own the fence. It is anticipated livestock rates will be raised by this initiative.

Fact File

- The Royalties for Regions Country Local Government Fund (CLGF) helps local governments in regional WA build and maintain infrastructure.
- The CLGF Regional Grouping Fund is separate to the CLGF and encourages local governments to come together to deliver projects that benefit multiple towns and regions.
- Since 2008, more than \$306million has been allocated to CLGF, which has seen about 1200 projects funded across 109 country local governments.



Price welcomes assistance for farming families

21 March 2014

Federal Member for Durack Melissa Price has welcomed the passing of legislation that will see permanent assistance available for Durack farming families under the new Farm Household Allowance.

"The passage of the Form Household Support Bill 2014 will give more farming families in Durack, and in particular those who are doing it tough in the Wheatbelt, access to income support when they need it, no matter what the cause," Ms Price said.

The allowance, paid at the same rate as NewStart Allowance, replaces Exceptional Circumstances arrangements from 1 July 2014. It will also replace the Interim Farm Household Allowance introduced to help farmers in the lead up to commencement of the legislated allowance.

"Until recently the asset test for this sort of payment has been an issue. In particular the value of onfarm assets has been a barrier to some farming families being eligible for income assistance," Ms Price said.

"The new payment has a higher asset test, making it more realistic for farming families in hardship to access assistance.

"The allowance will be available to farmers and their partners who meet the criteria – the funding is uncapped; we're not limiting how many farmers we help."

The Farm Household Allowance will be available to recipients for up to three years. Recipients will be automatically issued with a Health Care Card, and have access to \$3,000 for support or training.

Wild Dogs Bounty Scheme

Pastoralists

The shire of Murchison has developed a wild Dog Bounty Scheme to aid in the control of wild dogs on properties. Details as follows:-

The Shire of Murchison Wild Dog Control Bounty Scheme has been developed to offer a bounty of \$100 per dog for every wild dog killed.

Doggers and professionals are excluded from the scheme.

It covers all stations within the shire of Murchison except for those covered by the state's trial scheme which is being established in conjunction with the Meekatharra Rangelands Biosecurity Association. Bounty payments for dogs killed on those stations can be claimed under that scheme.

All claims are to be made by the station owner/manager. Persons destroying the dog must take the scalps to the property owner/ manager. The property owner/manager makes their own arrangements with the person who destroyed the dog regarding payment.

Scalps are defined as the two ears and the strip of scalp connecting them and the tail.

Property Owner/Manager must complete the form with all details and verify number of scalps.

Property Owner/Manager is then responsible for getting the forms and the scalps to one of the three regional coordinators for authorisation.

Once regional coordinators have authorised payment the form is to be sent to the Shire of Murchison who will make the payment to the claimant and maintain a data base of all the details.






