

## Wild Dogs Bounty Scheme

#### **Pastoralists**

The shire of Murchison has developed a wild Dog Bounty Scheme to aid in the control of wild dogs on properties. Details as follows:-

The Shire of Murchison Wild Dog Control Bounty Scheme has been developed to offer a bounty of \$100 per dog for every wild dog killed.

Doggers and professionals are excluded from the scheme.

It covers all stations within the shire of Murchison except for those covered by the state's trial scheme which is being established in conjunction with the Meekatharra Rangelands Biosecurity Association. Bounty payments for dogs killed on those stations can be claimed under that scheme.

All claims are to be made by the station owner/manager. Persons destroying the dog must take the scalps to the property owner/ manager. The property owner/manager makes their own arrangements with the person who destroyed the dog regarding payment.

Scalps are defined as the two ears and the strip of scalp connecting them.

Property Owner/Manager must complete the form with all details and verify number of scalps.

Property Owner/Manager is then responsible for getting the forms and the scalps to one of the three regional coordinators for authorisation.

Once regional coordinators have authorised payment the form is to be sent to the Shire of Murchison who will make the payment to the claimant and maintain a data base of all the details.







## Keeping Durack kids safe in the water

1 December 2014

Families living in Durack will benefit from a new initiative aimed at increasing water safety for young children.

The Member for Durack, Melissa Price, said the initiative was aimed at children under five and teaching them about water safety. Ms Price said the new programme consists of songs, videos and books which communicate the water safety message in a fun and engaging format for youngsters.

"Child care centres, kindergartens, play groups and water safety groups in the Kimberly, Pilbara, Gascoyne, Mid-west and Wheatbelt are receiving the educational packs," Ms Price said.

"More than 80,000 are being distributed nationally and they are available online at www.kidsalive.com.au.

"The programme has been developed by water safety campaigner and former Olympic swimming coach Laurie Lawrence and builds on his highly successful Living with Water DVD.

"It teaches our children how to be safe at the beach, around pools, rivers and dams which is crucial to keep our kids safe this summer," Ms Price said.

"As families and communities we need to work together to reduce the tragedy of drowning. We need to make sure that we are water safe.

The 2014 National Drowning Report showed that 20 children aged under five had drowned between July 2013 and June 2014; the new programme is one component of the Australian Government's comprehensive approach to water safety. The Government recently announced a \$4 million investment to assist the Royal Life Saving Society of Australia's work to prevent drowning in inland waterways. Other programmes are delivered by AUSTSWIM and Surf Life Saving under a \$15 million commitment from the Government to reduce drownings nationwide. Australia Post is supporting the new children's programme meaning more children and families will benefit from receiving the educational material.



#### Winners of outback kids' photo competition announced

Runner up was Adriel, a Year 3 student also from Meekatharra School of the Air. Adriel's photo 'Golden Road' captures the bright sun on a road with dark rain clouds. He will receive a Fujifilm FinePix XP70 compact camera.

"The competition is a great opportunity to raise awareness of natural resource management and further involve our next generation of land managers in having pride in our rangelands landscapes and our regional communities," Dr Mackenzie said.

The competition awarded a first and second overall prize and a first, second and third for the age groups Lower Primary (Kindy, Pre-Primary, Years 1 and 2), Middle Primary (Years 3, 4 and 5) and Upper Primary (Years 6 and 7).

Rangelands NRM Communications Manager Teresa Belcher said a special thanks also goes to all the 2014 Sponsors.

#### OPPORTUNITIES FOR HEALTH CARE IN THE MURCHISON REGION

The Royal Flying Doctor Service ceased operating the GP clinic in Meekatharra at the beginning of October. This change brings about an opportunity to change the way we deliver health in the Murchison region.

The WA Country Health Service has assured me that by providing two full time doctors there is continuity in GP Coverage Meekatharra, while we work to deliver the best way to provide future GP services for the region.

Meekatharra health services sit within the Murchison Multi-Purpose Service (MPS) which also include health centres at Yalgoo, Mt Magnet, Cue and Sandstone.

The concept of the Mid West Health Initiative has been developed to outline developments required in the Mid West to improve Health outcomes for residents of the region.

My vision for the Mid West Health Initiative (MWHI) includes:

- The rebuild of Meekatharra Hospital.
- Development of a Meekatharra Primary Care Centre to include GP Services, Murchison Hostel Requirements Mental Health, Drug and Alcohol services, Dental, Allied health, visiting specialists and other visiting teams. These services are currently spread across several buildings on the Meekatharra hospital site.
- Refurbishment of the Murchison Aged Care hostel and construction of two new units.
- Establishment of Nurse practitioner services to Meekatharra to support GP's in delivering services.
- Increased use of Tele health facilities to reduce the need for patient and specialist travel.

I look forward to updating the community as we progress to make these plans a reality and make lasting and significant changes to healthcare in the Murchison.

#### North West Central Athletes Get Travel Boost

Talented young athletes from North West Central are one step closer to realising their sporting dreams thanks to a new round of *Royalties for Regions*-funded Athlete Travel Subsidy Scheme (ATSS) grants.

As part of the overall Supporting Community Sport initiative designed by The Nationals WA prior to the 2013 State election, the ATSS is in its second year of supporting talented regional athletes pursue regional, state or national representation in their sport.

Member for North West Central Vince Catania MLA said Royalties for Regions was helping ease the financial burden on families of young regional athletes aspiring to reach the pinnacle of their sporting code.

"I am pleased Royalties for Regions is assisting opportunities for regional athletes and encouraging the next generation of athletes, since sport and recreation play a central role in vibrant and sustainable communities," he said.

"It is important that young aspiring athletes have the opportunity to pursue sporting success not just for health and wellbeing reasons, but as an example to others of living a fit and healthy life."

In this round 191 regional athletes will receive subsidies of up to \$1750 each, totalling \$128,238. The scheme is for athletes aged from 13 to 21.

Over the next four years Royalties for Regions is contributing \$1.75 million towards subsidising regional athletes' travel and accommodation expenses associated with attending training camps and competitions at regional, state and national level.

"We know that participating in sport and recreation has numerous benefits for health and wellbeing and this scheme means there's more support for people taking part around the state" Vince said. "To support athletes progressing to the high performance pathway by subsidising some of their expenses is fantastic for their development."

Sports played by the latest round of ATSS recipients includes netball, yachting, touch football, gymnastics, football, polocrosse, squash, golf, roller sports, hockey, cycling, orienteering and surf lifesaving.

In spite of it all, at the end of the night he'll have managed to give every child something right.


And he'll sit by the fire with a big jug of beer and wish you all, "Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!"

# The origins of Christmas

A Roman almanac confirms that 25 December was used to celebrate Christmas in 336 AD, although it was nearly 600 years later that the churches created a liturgy – a service for public worship – for the occasion.

The choice of date is believed to have been influenced by the northern hemisphere winter solstice, as well as ancient pagan rituals that coincided with the solstice. These rituals included the Halcyon Days in Greece, a period of calm and goodwill when it was believed the sea was calm for birds to lay their eggs; and the Roman celebration of Saturnalia, a celebration of the god Saturn, which involved wild parties, the exchange of gifts and the temporary suspension of social divisions between slaves and masters.

# Christmas traditions and symbols

Christmas trees are part of a long tradition of greenery being taken into the home at Christmas to brighten the dreary winter. Mistletoe was popular with Druid priests because it remained green throughout winter. Holly placed over the doorway was believed to drive away evil. Placing branches from trees in the home was first recorded in 1494, and by the beginning of the 1600s there are records of fir trees being decorated with apples.

The story of Santa Claus has its origins in the legends surrounding the humble generosity of Saint Nicholas whose feast day is celebrated on 6th December. Saint Nicholas was a 4th century Christian Bishop from Myra (in modern-day Turkey) who became the Patron Saint of Children. In Germany and Poland, boys dressed up as bishops begging alms for the poor. Later, the Christ child 'Christkindlein' was said to have accompanied Nicholas-like figures on their travels. The 1822 poem 'Twas the Night before Christmas forged the link and Saint Nicholas (Father Christmas, Pere Noel, Christ Kind, Kriss Kringle or Sinter Klass) became known as Santa Claus.

Christmas is celebrated in many parts of the world on 25 December. Protestant and Roman Catholic churches hold Christmas Day services on 25 December. The Eastern churches – the Ethiopian Orthodox church, Russian Orthodox church and the Armenian church – celebrate Christmas on 6 or 7 January. There have been rituals, parties and celebrations at this time of year for thousands of years.

# The birth of Jesus

Christmas is the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ, Christians believe that Jesus is 'the son of God', the Messiah sent from Heaven to save the world. The 'Christmas story' tells of the birth of Jesus in a stable in Bethlehem, the angels announcing the birth to the shepherds in the fields, and the Magi (wise men from the East) visiting the stable and offering gifts to the newborn child.



# Christmas Baking

#### Iced Ginger Cookies - makes 3 dozen



#### **Ingredients**

2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 1 teaspoon baking soda 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg

1/2 teaspoon ground cloves 1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup butter, softened 1 1/2 cups white sugar

1 cup pumpkin puree 1 egg

1 tsp vanilla extract

Glaze

1T melted butter 2 cups icing sugar

3 T milk

1 tsp vanilla extract

#### **Directions**

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Combine flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, nutmeg, ground cloves, and salt.

In a medium bowl, cream together the 1/2 cup of butter and white sugar. Add pumpkin, egg, and 1 teaspoon vanilla to butter mixture, and beat until creamy. Mix in dry ingredients. Drop tablespoonfuls onto cookie sheet, flatten slightly.

Bake for 15 to 20 minutes in a preheated oven. Cool cookies, then drizzle glaze.

To Make Glaze: Combine icing sugar, milk, 1 tablespoon melted butter, and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Add milk as needed, to achieve drizzling consistency.

#### Cranberry Pudding (10inch pan)

#### **Ingredients**

6 tablespoons butter

2 cups evaporated milk 2 cups white sugar

1 3/4 cup cranberries (can sub blue berries) 4 cups all-purpose flour

cup butter 4 teaspoons baking powder

2 cups white sugar 1 teaspoon salt

1 cup cream **Directions** 

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F (165 degrees C). Grease and flour a 10 inch pan. Mix together the flour, baking powder and salt. Set aside.

In a large bowl, cream together the 6 tablespoons butter and 2 cups sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in the flour mixture alternately with the evaporated milk. Stir in the cranberries./blue berries. Pour batter into prepared pan.

Bake in the preheated oven for 50 to 60 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the center of the cake comes out clean. Let cool in pan for 10 minutes, then turn out onto a wire rack and cool.

To make the Hot Butter Sauce: In a saucepan, combine 1 cup butter, 2 cups sugar, and cream. Bring to a boil over medium heat, reduce heat and let simmer for 10 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Serve slices of cake generously covered with hot butter sauce.

#### **Rum Balls**

8 wheat bix - crushed 1/2 cup coconut

2 T cocoa 1/2 cup chopped raisins

1 tin condensed milk 2 dessert spoons of rum

#### **Directions**

Mix all dry ingredients, add condensed milk and rum, mix well and place in fridge for 1/2 hour.

Roll into balls and then roll in coconut. Place in air tight container and leave for 12 hours before serving. Yum!



# Christmas Baking cont..

#### Grandma's Special Ham Glaze -makes 1 1/4 cups

1 x bone in shank ham

1/2 cup brown sugar

3 cloves garlic

1/2 cup mango chutney

2 teaspoons orange zest

1/8 cup orange juice

1/4 cup Dijon mustard



#### **Directions**

Combine brown sugar, garlic, mango chutney, orange zest, orange juice, and mustard in the bowl of a food processor. Process until smooth.

To use glaze, brush on cooked smoked ham, and bake at 350 degrees F for 1 hour.

#### **Slow Baked Ham**

1 x bone-in shank ham

4 cups water, or as needed

1/2 cup honey

1/2 cup brown sugar

2 tablespoons liquid smoke flavouring

2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

1 pinch ground cloves

#### **Directions**


Preheat the oven to 275 degrees F (135 degrees C). Place ham in a roasting pan. Pour in water to a 2 inch depth. Cover with a tight fitting lid.

Bake for 6 to 8 hours in the preheated oven (all day or all night). Remove from the oven, pour off drippings and reserve. Debone ham, removing any excess fat as well, and return to the roasting pan.

Skim fat from the top of the drippings, and discard. In a small bowl, mix one cup of the dripping with honey, brown sugar, liquid smoke, Worcestershire sauce and cloves. Pour this over the ham, cover and return to the oven. Remaining drippings may be discarded or reserved for other uses. Bake for another 30 to 40 minutes in the preheated oven. Let stand for 10 minutes before serving.


