A pretty significant milestone was recently reached with the completion of the bitumen seal from the Settlement to our Shire's southern Boundary. My sincere thanks go to all that have been a part of this major project that first began with the sealing of the Jiggernoo Airstrip and overtaking lane in the early 2000's.

Early in November I was privileged to be invited to the 20-year birthday celebration of the Pia Wadjarri School. The staff and kids put on a first-class day, and I really enjoyed seeing their pride and excitement in what had been achieved.


The Shire (and I'm sure quite a few in the community) were sad to say goodbye to Rachel and her kids who have headed off to a new home

As evidenced on the roads front, as indicated with a "smashing" front cover pic, a major achievement to be very proud of is the completed sealing of the Carnarvon-Mullewa Road from the Settlement south to the City of Greater Geraldton boundary. Records show that it took 20 years!!!! Any wonder

we organised a ribbon breaking pic! Since 2021 our construction crew (Jonesy's Cavaliers), with various sealing firms, have constructed and sealed an impressive 35.42km to 7.2m width, with 98km in the previous 17 years. Pretty impressive!!!.



In the office many thanks to Racheal, who has now left for Tammin Shire, Vicki, Steven and Lisa for their tireless efforts and to Travis's financial expertise on a drive-in drive-out basis.

Since taking over as operators of the Roadhouse and Caravan Park in March 2021, with the support of Council and Nick and Pix as new lead staff, alongside a raft of casuals, our operation has steadily improved and continues to remain well respected.

Shire Works

Construction

Back in September the blast of a hill on the Carnarvon-Mullewa Road, set off by Lisa Keen, created a fair amount of excitement as well as leaving a mountain of dirt to be moved.



Following clearing of an immense pile of rocks using two bulldozers, compaction and sheeting commenced early in the week of 19th September.

Stabilised Pavements of Australia (SPA) cement stabilised a number of floodways ahead of final sealing works which were undertaken in November.



The new 9km of seal has been laid and, for the first time, we can say it was a painless experience. Bitutek clearly sent their A-team, they not only were on time but 2 days early and dealt with the few minor breakdowns promptly and efficiently. My thanks to Bitutek, Rob (Supervisor) and his crew.

On completion of this job the crews spent a few weeks patching potholes in the bitumen on the Carnarvon-Mullewa Road before moving onto the Beringarra-Pindar Road.

They will then commence works approximately 2km south of the Greenough River, with two short re-sheet jobs, before moving south - picking up jobs in various locations including work on floodways and the removal of some old and undersized culverts at the Bumbinyoo Flat.

Eventually the crew will end up at the Wreath Flowers Section, where a dual carriageway will be created as a safety measure funded in part through Main Roads Blackspot Funds. This work will only be completed in the new year after the crew return from their Christmas break.

Gardener/Handyman

After Ryan's resignation we welcomed Des O'Brien to the team. Des has brought considerable experience with him, appears to have settled in and is getting on with the job at hand. We welcome Des and Wendy into the community and hope it turns out to be a long stay.

Pothole Patching

The crews recently spent 4 days patching potholes on the sealed section of the Carnarvon-Mullewa Road, there are still some minor potholes to be done sometime in the new year.

Maintenance

In September the maintenance crew completed the Twin Peaks-Wooleen Road, New Forrest-Yallalong Road, Coolcalalaya Road to the Rabbit Proof Fence on the Northampton side, and are regrading the Carnarvon-Mullewa Road north of the Settlement. They were also subsequently involved in the pothole patching.

In October the Twin Peaks-Wooleen Rd was completed and in November the crew headed north on the Beringarra-Pindar Rd before heading back towards Tallering to do some more tidy up work, as well as rectifing some offshoot drain intakes that have vegetation and sand blocks.

The maintenance crew are continuing up the Beringarra-Pindar Road heading north. With flood damage work underway their work is a little adhoc, sometimes being behind and at other times ahead of the Squires Resources crew. They have also sorted out a few troublesome grids on the Mt Wittenoom Road. At least 2 of these will need to be replaced in the new year.

Flood Damage

By September flood damage packages had cranked up for Floods 8, 9 and 10. Squires Resources commenced work (package 1) on the McNabb-Twin Peaks Road.



They then moved onto the Beringarra-Pindar Road from our south boundary to about Boolardy homestead. Squires Resources continue to progress well, with work on Meeberrie-Wooleen, Woolgorong, New Forest-Yallalong, Coolcalalaya, Errabiddy, Butchers Track and Muggon Roads nearing completion.

THEM Earthmoving (package 2) are due to commence work on Monday 21 November starting on the Byro-Woodleigh Road.

Beringarra-Cue Road – revert to unsealed road

By October Rowe Contractors completed conversion of around 40km of sealed road back to gravel as well as putting in several new bunds.



Apart from some weather delays they are progressing very well and delivering work of a very high standard, including sorting out the drainage on certain sections. By the end of November there should be a little less than 25km left. We are well ahead of schedule time wise and right on budget.



6 Kurara Way

In September AGFIX Multitrades made a start on the repair and renovation of 6 Kurara Way with scheduled completion in the new year.

Settlement Water Supply

Comments and suggestions have been sent back to GHD with regard to pipe type and size, disinfection and firefighting facilities.

Maintenance Vehicle

Budget provided for the replacement of the Maintenance Gang's Isuzu truck with a Landcruiser utility. New vehicles are now notoriously difficult to secure without a long waiting period but fortuitously, by acting quickly, we were able to source one in Perth.

MRWA Regional Road Group Funding

Submissions for the reconstruction and widening of the following sections of the Carnarvon-Mullewa Road were submitted for Regional Road Group Funding for 2023/24.

- SLK 190.21-193 42 north of the Twin Peaks-Wooleen Road
- SLK 222.83-226.47 north of the Ballinyoo Bridge.

Estimated cost for each project is \$450k, with funding on a 2:1 basis (\$300k each). Both were subsequently assessed by Main Roads and the Technical Working Group and have been accepted. A request for additional Reserve Projects to be submitted was also endorsed.

The Murchison Regional Roads Sub Group also examined a floodway discussion paper prepared by the CEO and have recommended that a floodway criterion be examined for inclusion into the scoring matrix.

It was noted that the Technical Working Group will also be examining the Road Type descriptions, specifically in relation to criteria for seal widths for sealing roads within the region. In part it has been noted that traffic criteria were set in 1999 and now do not now relate to what is happening, which, in practice, is sealing a road to a minimum of 7.0m width.

The option of sealing only 4.0m is not current best practice. Both these aspects are welcome.

Niche Wall

Murchison Rammed Earth have completed the niche wall at the cemetery.



Main Roads WA SKA Roads Access Agreement

In October the final Main Roads WA SKA Roads Access Agreement was reviewed by the delegated Councillor Working Group who authorised its signing.

A Stage 1 Works Program will be prepared and submitted to Main Roads for sections of the Twin Peaks-Wooleen, Wooleen-Mt Wittenoom, Boolardy-Wooleen, Beringarra-Pindar and Boolardy-Kalli Roads associated with SKA Construction Traffic.

Seal Widening Works

Initial planning and budgeting for sealed widening works on the Carnarvon-Mullewa Road in the new year envisaged stabilisation of the existing pavement with additional pavement material with cement also required in some floodway areas.

Work is in progress on the best way to achieve seal widening works cost effectively and efficiently. We are now also looking at other stabilisation possibilities given that we may not have to cart material which we have yet to find, and / or have to cart material considerable distances depending on the source of gravel supply if and when found.

Sealed Pavement Cost Contribution

Greenfield Technical Services were commissioned to undertake a preliminary assessment of the potential impact of heavy vehicle traffic on typical sealed pavements, with particular emphasis on the Carnarvon-Mullewa Road. The need to quantify a contribution that heavy vehicles make to the wear tear and damage over and above "normal" use, given expected future mine

operations who may use this road is a key future strategy.

The models prepared in the assessment highlight the need to further develop this analysis and possibly reduce the range of uncertainty within the model. Conducting testing of the CBR of the existing insitu pavement and/or subgrade material, as well as undertaking pavement dippings to establish the typical pavement thickness for various roads in the Shire, is required.



In conjunction with Greenfields we will soon commence such a testing program and will also continue to collect and improve the quality and completeness of the Shire's traffic data to reduce uncertainty in any future model.

Road Asset Management

2022 saw a revaluation of Council's buildings and road assets as part of 5 yearly cyclic update, the results of which will be reflected in the 2021/22 Financial Reports.

Rather than just addressing this legislative requirement, additional detailed work is being undertaken to use the information collected to improve road management operations to also address a raft of future road upgrade requirements, and to include additional funding that Council has been able to attract.

It is expected that in early 2023 this will lead to an update to the current 2013 Asset Management Plan and Long-Term Financial Plan.

Carnarvon-Mallewa Road Seal Completion



On Saturday 19 November 2022 the Shire finally completed sealing to 7.2m width the remaining 9.0km gravel section on the Carnarvon-Mullewa Road between the Murchison Settlement and our southern Shire boundary.



This means we have constructed and sealed to a 7.2m width 35.42km since 2021!!!!!



As shown above with the symbolic "breaking" of a ribbon we are very proud of this achievement. As the history shows there has been a cumulation of some 20 years work to construct and seal the 133.42km from 7.2km north of the Murchison

Settlement to the southern boundary with the City of Greater Geraldton boundary. This includes the replacement of the historic Ballinyoo Bridge.

Prior to 2021 the road was sealed to a 4.0m general standard, with widened sections at floodway areas, but since 2021, following a policy review by Council, the minimum seal width was increased to 7.2m.



Meanwhile Council continues to work with the City of Greater Geraldton in an attempt to get them to complete the remaining 27km section within their boundary.



Marchison Settlement Redevelopment

With Mid-West Development Commission funding, concept designs and a business case for an SKA Interpretive Experience Project in Murchison has been finalised by lead consultants UDLA and others. The final draft, "Murchison Vast Sky Experience Business Case", has been submitted to Council prior to undertaking public consultation. It includes elements such as an Interpretive Centre, extensions to our Caravan Park and provision of glamping accommodation. It is a significant, regionally focussed economic project.

The overall aim is to integrate elements such as star gazing, local Wadjarri art and culture, pastoral heritage and discovery walking trails. Stage 1 spend is around \$10.4m with further stages foreshadowed totalling \$11.5m over around a 10-year period. The business case shows a profitable



operation after 2 years. Significant levels of external funding will be required.





This comes on the back of Preliminary Masterplan works, including a space themed playground, swimming pool and splashpad, community centre and museum improvements plus improved roadhouse operations, funding for which Council is separately pursuing.



Through funding suppport from Lottery West and others work is well underway in preparing for the ingural "Ancient Land Under Brilliant Skies Festival on 15-16 April 2023

Meanwhile our Council managed Roadhouse and Caravan Park operations continues to work well with positve reviews.



Murchison Vast Sky Experience Business Case Public Comment Request

As outlined previously under the Murchison Settlement Redevelopment, at the November Council Meeting, the final draft "Murchison Vast Sky Experience Business Case" was submitted to Council, where it was resolved that it be endorsed it principle and that public comment be sought.

Outline

Development progress for the draft Murchison Vast Sky Experience Business Case has been significant, involving a range of stakeholders including Settlement Redevelopment Working Group Members Cr Emma- Foulkes-Taylor, Cr Michelle Fowler, Frances Pollock, Community Manager-DCEO and Works Manager.



Work commenced in around November 2021 with several stakeholder workshops. At the October Council Meeting day Scott Lang from UDLA presented the final draft to councillors and representatives from CSIRO and PIA Wadjarri.

The final draft of the Murchison Vast Sky Experience Business Case is in many ways a development with potential transformative effect. It ticks an abundance of boxes such as strategically linking Dark Sky tourism, showcasing SKA / CSIRO, providing an accessible outback feel without camping out, increased GeoTourism and broader tourism within a regional context and purveying local history and pastoral influence, inclusion of local Wadjarri Aboriginal development opportunities, improved discovery walking trails, as well as enhancing recruitment and retention opportunities for the Shire in an improved, visually attractive environment.



The work undertaken by UDLA, and others has led the Midwest Development Commission to have the project high on their priority list for potential major funding for the next State Budget.




Context

The entire business case should be seen as being complimentary to the Murchison Settlement Masterplan and Roadhouse development plans that have already been undertaken.

The business case has been written and presented in a form that meets what external funding bodies will be looking for. This enhances potential for funding but also makes it easier to reference for funding applications for other separate but integrated projects.

Stage 1 spend is around \$10.4m with further stages foreshadowed totalling \$11.5m over about a 10-year period. Business Case shows a profitable operation after 2 years. Significant levels of external funding will be required.



Even if Stage 1 works are not funded, there are significant elements that can be incorporated and delivered as part of the existing Settlement Masterplan Redevelopment. Eg Dark Sky, SKA related elements and Wadjarri Stories and Culture.

When viewing the Draft Business Case it is essential that it be viewed in context that any delivery will likely be very long term with significant external investment, and that this will also need to align with other Murchison Settlement developments already identified.



"On behalf of the Pia Wadjarri RCS we would like to say a huge thank-you for the invaluable experience you provided us with on Friday 21st November when Dr Peter Ricci and his entourage of 5th year vet students, nurses and qualified vets from Murdoch University, Communities Outreach Program, The Animals Hospital set up clinic in our Wadjarri Room to perform desexing and preventative health checks on the dogs and cats in the community."



The students were totally engaged; watching the desexing procedures on both male and female cats and dogs, asking questions, assisting the nurses and vets when asked, looking for parasites on a saliva sample through the microscope, patting the animals to keep them calm.



It has provided a huge amount of information for the students to process and write about back in the classroom. The senior students have added the professions of vet, vet nurse, and ranger to their Pathways board.



The vet students themselves provided an important role model to the Pia students, as this is what learning at University level looks like. The younger students spoke about their feelings they experienced over the day and why they felt that way.



It has encouraged an understanding of not letting the animals' breed unnecessarily and desexing is a way to prevent that happening.



All in all it was an amazing experience!!

Wajarri SKA ILUA Signing Celebration

On 5 November 2022 at the Murchison Settlement Community Hall, and after 7 years it was time to celebrate the conclusion of the ILUA negotiations and the signing of the agreement.

Australia's national science agency, CSIRO, has welcomed a new Wajarri Yamaji traditional name for its radio astronomy observatory in Mid-West Western Australia.

The name Inyarrimanha Ilgari Bundara means 'sharing sky and stars' in the Wajarri language

The traditional name is part a new Indigenous Land Use Agreement, or ILUA, signed by Wajarri Yamaji. CSIRO, Australian and Western Australian Governments, recognising the Wajarri Yamaji people as the Traditional Owners and native title holders of the land on which the *Inyarrimanha Ilgari Bundara/* SKAObservatory sits.

The agreement enables expansion of CSIRO's radio astronomy observatory site to allow for construction of the international SKA-Low telescope, part of the global SKA Observatory, alongside existing instruments, including CSIRO's ASKAP radio telescope.

During an on-Country event on 5 November 2022 to celebrate the ILUA, the Wajarri Yamaji

announced the gift of a traditional name for the expanded observatory site.

The traditional name was suggested by Wajarri woman Shakira Whitehurst for a competition run by the Wajarri Yamaji Aboriginal Corporation (WYAC) and selected by members of the Wajarri Minangu Land Committee, the Traditional Owners of the observatory area on Wajarri Country.

The Wajarri name will be one part of a new dual, official name for the site: Inyarrimanha Ilgari Bundara, the CSIRO Murchison Radio-astronomy Observatory.

Jennylyn Hamlett, WYAC Chairperson and Minangu Land Committee member, said the meaning of the Wajarri name for the observatory site is 'sharing the sky and stars'.



Cake Cutting Celebration

CSIRO Chief Executive Larry Marshall said he was humbled that the Wajarri Yamaji had chosen a name connecting the rich heritage of the region's first astronomers to Country with the modern scientific instruments on the site.

"Protecting heritage and Country are critical elements of the ILUA, and CSIRO is proud to be partnering with the Wajarri Yamaji in the land management and cultural heritage protection of the observatory site, ensuring that we leave our footprints carefully in the sands of time as we walk side by side into a better future together."

Through its Reconciliation Action Plan, CSIRO is committed to building genuine partnerships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples through education, science, innovation and research.

The new ILUA with the Wajarri Yamaji People demonstrates this commitment by fostering a culture that respects and honours the rich history of the nation.



Construction of the SKA-Low telescope at Inyarrimanha Ilgari Bundara, the CSIRO Murchison Radio-astronomy Observatory, is expected to begin later this year.

The SKA-Low telescope, alongside its counterpart SKA-Mid in South Africa, will explore the universe in more detail than ever before, transforming our understanding of the cosmos and benefitting society through global collaboration and innovation.

Shire President Rossco Foulkes-Taylor was happy to express his appreciation of the successful event and the milestone it represents.

Southern Rangelands Pastoral Alliance



The Southern Rangelands Pastoral Alliance (SRPA) is a non-profit incorporated community association governed by a Board of 9 members, all pastoralists in the Southern Rangelands, which encompasses all of the land area south of the Pilbara, excluding the Agricultural Zone of the South West Land Division.

SRPA Aims

The Southern Rangelands Pastoral Alliance was formed to provide leadership and support for sustainable pastoral production and diversification in the Southern Rangelands.

SRPA Vision

Connected, Producer-Driven, Healthy Landscapes, Better Business SRPA Mission

To lead change by sharing knowledge, and facilitating research and innovation based on industry needs.

The Shire is one of the early financial supporters of the SRPA and, as reported to the October Council Meeting, Crs Rossco and Emma Foulkes-Taylor attended the Alliance's Forum in Geraldton on 24 October 2022.

The event was well supported ,with around 30 people from 15 different stations and another 5 0 odd industry reps in attendance. The spread of stations represented was from near Carnarvon, north-east area of the UG Shire, a few hundred km north and east of Wiluna, eastern Goldfields and several areas in between.

Nutrien, as principal sponsor for the day, had several of their reps attending, alongside soil health/ carbon experts, animal health specialists/researchers, Ag, Emergency, Water depts. With the Minister for Agriculture there for half a day a total of about 55 attended.

With presentations on animal nutrition, climate forecasting, fire season potential, cattle breeding and water bore licensing requirements, much of the information seems regularly distributed by media releases, industry newsletters etc.

Presentations on ruminant methane emissions, soil health, photosynthesis/carbon cycles, potential drone usage for vermin control and setting up a computer/electronics-based station monitoring system were particularly interesting.

Minister for Agriculture Alannah MacTiernan's presentation was a breath of fresh air, with her enthusiasm, knowledge and aspirations for the future of the Southern Rangeland areas strongly evident.



The Minister seems incredulous, almost furious, that cattle and sheep carbon emissions (mainly through methane) are put in the same category as a coal fired power station.

She strongly articulated that the animal cycle is one of consuming plants (which stimulates more photosynthesis thus removing extra carbon from the atmosphere), disturbs and aerates the soil, converts cellulose and carbohydrates into useable protein (meat) and then drops dung which nourishes the same soil. While this process does emit methane (CH4) back into the atmosphere, to have it in the same category of digging up a fossil fuel and burning it in a one-off process to provide power, just doesn't stack up.


